## 1 Introduction and Forewords

### 1.1 Introduction & Highlights

Nursing Homes Ireland is pleased to present the Private & Voluntary Nursing Home Survey 2014/2015 (“the Survey”) which has been compiled by BDO.

The survey was undertaken in early 2015 when a detailed questionnaire was sent to every registered private and voluntary nursing home in the country. Responses were received from 152 nursing homes which equates to a 35% response rate. The response rate has provided a sample which is considered to be an appropriate representation of the overall population being examined.

Where reference is made to a finding for the 2014/2015 Survey the period being referred to is the year to 31<sup>st</sup> December 2014.

The primary purpose of the Survey is to report comprehensively on the state of the private and voluntary nursing home industry in Ireland, to analyse key industry indicators and trends and to report on matters of concern to nursing home operators.

Some key findings of the 2014/2015 Survey are outlined below. Comparisons with the 2009/2010 survey are outlined where appropriate. (the survey was not conducted in the intervening years).

- **Supply of beds** - There are presently **437** private and voluntary homes providing a total of 22,342 beds. There has been an **8.51%** increase in the supply of private and voluntary beds since 2009.
- **Population per private bed** - Nationally there is presently **one private nursing home bed for every 20.23 persons aged 65 and over** in the Republic of Ireland.
- **Occupancy** - National average occupancy amongst Survey respondents was **90.58%** in 2014. This represented an increase of 4.18% since 2009.
- **Weekly rates** - The average rate nationally prevailing under the Nursing Home Support Scheme (“the Fair Deal”) for accommodation in private and voluntary nursing homes was €896. (the average weekly rate under the Fair Deal for accommodation in public nursing homes was €1,245 in 2011, the last time this information was published)
- **Staff costs** - Staff costs accounted for **61% of turnover** in respondents homes. The national average staff cost per registered bed was found to be **€27,130**. This represents an 18% increase since 2009.
- **Food costs** - Average annual food cost per resident in 2014 was **€2,487**. This represents an increase of 13.4% since 2009.
- **Dependency** - Over **65%** of residents accommodated in respondents homes were in the **high or max dependency** categories compared to 54% in 2009. Approximately **45%** of residents were reported to have been clinically diagnosed with **dementia**.

## ***1.2 Foreword by Tadhg Daly, Chief Executive Officer, Nursing Homes Ireland***

The ageing of the population is to be celebrated and is a measure of the advances in living standards, technology and treatment of medical conditions. Ireland is experiencing an increasing ageing population similar to many countries worldwide and as a nation we need to develop a range of policies and services to address the challenges this presents.



An analysis of the demographics confirms that there will be significant pressure in the area of residential care but also on the wider health and social care system for older people. This pressure on residential care is to increase significantly in the coming years based on the demographic, social and economic pressures.

The lack of a clear and cohesive policy and national strategy for the long-term care of our older population, combined with uncertainty around current and future funding arrangements, poses one of the biggest challenges to the long-term sustainability of the nursing home sector.

A sustainable and viable nursing home sector has a key role to play in addressing the well documented difficulties in our acute hospital emergency departments and addressing challenges of meeting the residential care requirements of an ageing population.

NHI as the national representative organisation for the private and voluntary nursing home sector has a significant contribution to make to the development of services to our older population. Our experience and our ideas will be important in informing and shaping the development of public policy on the care of older people.

Since the completion of the 2009/2010 Annual Private Nursing Home Survey there has been a decrease in the number of private and voluntary nursing homes in Ireland from 447 in 2009 to 437 in 2014. Despite this there has been an 8.51% increase in private and voluntary nursing home bed numbers - 20,590 to 22,342.

In the eleven year period to 2014 there was a 49% increase in the supply of private and voluntary bed numbers. There was a net increase of 29 private nursing homes in the same period.

This survey report confirms that the number of beds in the private and voluntary sector in 2014 have increased by 1,752 beds while at the same time the total number of nursing homes in operation has reduced by ten homes. This is indicative of a trend which confirms additional capacity added by existing nursing home owners.

Approximately 42% of Survey respondents indicated that they intended to develop additional bed numbers in the coming year indicating that this trend is set to continue. On average these respondents planned to develop 19 beds.



The current arbitrary NTPF criteria of ‘local market price’ and ‘county averages’ is illogical and if this policy continues may stymie current plans and the additional capacity required and will further stymie development in rural locations based on the current low level of NTPF fees.

The current and future arrangements for the funding and financing of nursing home care must also take account of the more acute needs of our ageing population and the actual costs incurred by nursing homes in providing resident centred care to residents. For example nursing homes that also care for dementia residents require fees to match the needs of those residents as recommended by the Oireachtas Health Committee (July 2014) and the Dementia Services Information and Design Centre (DSIDC - Jan 2015).

This model of existing providers increasing capacity is a significant element of the solution to the challenges as the existing operators have the experience together with a proven track record in what is a highly regulated market.

However, the Department of Health and the Government must address the issue of a ‘Fair Price for Care’ if they wish to enable the private and voluntary nursing home sector to provide the additional bed numbers which are forecast to be required.

The model of funding must provide a sustainable basis for the delivery of high quality nursing home care and also allow for on-going investment in service development. The nursing home sector is vital part of health service provision, a significant employer, contributing significantly to the national economy and has significant potential for future growth and development.

Additionally, serious issues surrounding the recruitment and retention of nurses. There is real and present threat to existing bed capacity if increasing numbers of nurses are not recruited, with nursing homes having no option but to potentially close beds at a time of increased demand for nursing home care.

This would be a very regrettable measure that would be enforced upon nursing homes. If it comes to fruition, it will have serious consequences for older persons requiring nursing home care and significant knock on affect across the wider health service.

The HSE Clinical Adaptation Programme must be extended beyond August 2015 and continue to tackle the large number of nurses on the waiting list for placement.

Furthermore inordinate delays in the registration of nurses by the NMBI are severely impacting upon capacity of nursing homes to recruit registered nurses. Timely registration is critical to enable nursing homes fulfil clinical staffing requirements. The Department of Health must also ensure adequate resourcing of the NMBI to ensure the Board can address the current delays in registration of nurses. There is an urgent and imperative requirement for immediate engagement with stakeholders to deliver a workforce plan for the entire health service (public, private and voluntary) that will place the substantial growth in requirement for gerontological nursing at the centre of it.

NHI reiterates its long-standing call for the Department of Health to take the lead in bringing stakeholders around the table through a Forum that would advise Government regarding appropriate planning and policy to meet the growing demand for nursing home care.

Notwithstanding these issues, private and voluntary nursing homes are uniquely positioned to tackle the challenges, as is evidenced in this survey's findings.

The private and voluntary sector has over the years 'stepped up to the plate' and responded to the increased demand for residential care for our ageing population. The sector is characterised by experienced and resilient operators who are committed to providing high quality, person centred care in local communities throughout Ireland.

The current providers have the experience, knowledge and proven track record. We believe the future requirements can be met by the current experienced providers with the right conditions. Department of Health strategy must ensure that the increasing numbers of our population that require nursing home care are able to access the care they need in a timely and cost effective manner.

But we need the State to plan with us for the decades ahead now, not when the crisis has deepened. This is a key moment for the increasing number of older people requiring long term residential care in Ireland. There is a requirement on Department of Health to address the challenges and give a clear direction on policy and funding in respect of long term care.

I am extremely grateful to our members who participated extensively and who made this insightful and valuable publication possible.

I would like to thank Homecare Medical Supplies and Bank of Ireland for their sponsorship of the survey, thanks also to Brian McEnery and his colleague Brian Haugh in BDO.

Finally, I would like to thank the Minister for Health, Leo Varadkar and his colleague Minister of State for Primary and Social Care Kathleen Lynch for their engagement with NHI and our sector. NHI and our Members are committed to working with Government in ensuring Ireland is positioned to address the challenges of meeting the health and social care requirements of our ageing population.

I welcome publication of the Nursing Homes Ireland Private & Voluntary Nursing Home Survey 2014/2015.

The nursing home sector has experienced significant and welcome change in relatively recent times, with the advent of the Nursing Home Support Scheme (Fair Deal) and independent regulation and inspection by the Health Information and Quality Authority. ## **1.4 Foreword by Brian McEnery, Partner & Head of Healthcare, BDO**

### INTRODUCTION & OVERVIEW OF BDO

This is the seventh Private & Voluntary Nursing Home Survey which I have undertaken on behalf of Nursing Homes Ireland. At BDO we are delighted to take part in what we view as an important piece of research in the nursing home industry. BDO is one of Ireland's leading accountancy and business advisory firms. The firm has offices located in Dublin, Limerick and Belfast with over 500 staff, including 40 partners.



Our firm currently acts for and advises in excess of 100 of the country's nursing home operators. We support many of these operators in their negotiations with the NTPF and with their funding and financing partners. There is no other firm with the breadth of knowledge and understanding of the issues of sustainability and viability within the sector. We have assisted nursing home operators to raise and restructure in excess of €500m in funding.

### THE YEAR IN REVIEW

2014 was a challenging year for the private and voluntary nursing home sector in Ireland. Costs have continued to be subject to upward pressure, in particular labour costs, while many operators are struggling to obtain a Fair Deal rate appropriate to their cost base. In recent years, the increasing number of residents applying for admission to the Fair Deal scheme has put considerable pressure on the Department of Health's budget for the provision of care to older persons. As a result the NTPF, on behalf of the HSE, have sought to minimise increases to operators' Fair Deal rates and in many instances have succeeded in obtaining reductions. In late 2014, a shortfall in the annual budget resulted in long delays in admitting older persons to the scheme as there was insufficient funding to pay for these bed spaces. This is not a sustainable approach to funding what looks set to be a growing requirement for older person care in the coming years.

In 2014, BDO published 'Health's Ageing Crisis: Time for Action' which examined the supply and demand factors impacting on the nursing home industry. Our research indicated that there will be a requirement for an additional 8,000 nursing home beds by 2021. We understand that it is the stated aim of the Minister for Health that the Fair Deal scheme be demand led. However, in the absence of the ability to secure an appropriate Fair Deal rate many operators who are considering expanding their provision are struggling to build a business case to invest substantial capital expenditure in the development of new nursing home beds. This is especially true for operators in more rural locations. The Department of Health are currently conducting a study into encouraging development of the sector and the Governmental action following the review will need to be clarified to reassure the sector of the longer term plans of Government.



## FUTURE GROWTH IN THE SECTOR

Despite the uncertainty around funding of the sector, there is nonetheless considerable interest in investment in the nursing home industry with many investors recognising that the ageing demographic in the Republic of Ireland will continue to drive high demand for nursing home accommodation. The extension of the Employee and Investment Incentive Scheme to include nursing homes has been a welcome move, which will hopefully lower the weighted average cost of funds for new developments. However, it is clear that the key factor in determining the viability of a proposed nursing home will continue to be its ability to secure an appropriate Fair Deal rate.

We would like to express our appreciation to those nursing home operators that took the time to complete the questionnaire. Without their efforts, the publication of the Survey would not be possible. I would also like to thank my colleague in BDO Brian Haugh, Senior Manager in our Healthcare Team, who assisted in the compilation of this year's survey.

Age demographics, together with increases in life expectancy, indicate the need for an increase in the nursing home bed capacity. The Survey results demonstrate that the development of nursing home capacity has lagged behind the growth of the ageing population in Ireland. Since 2003, there has been a net increase of 29 nursing homes (7%) from 408 to 437, with a corresponding 49% increase in the number of beds from 14,946 to 22,342. The 2011 Central Statistics Office (CSO) census found that the >65 population had increased by 15% to 539,303 since the previous 2006 census & the CSO predicted, in 2011, that the >65 population would increase by greater than 8% to c. 586,600 by 2014. The 2014/15 NHI Survey found that 56% of residents in nursing homes were aged over 85; an increase of 19% since the last survey, all providing clear evidence of longer life expectancy, which will result in increased demand for nursing home services.

Providing high quality care and meeting the Health Information and Quality Authority's standards requires considerable investment; respondents to the Survey stated in the previous 36 months that the average Capex costs required to comply with the standards were in the region of €579,430.

Bank of Ireland remains committed to providing funding and the benefits of its experience to the nursing home sector now and into the future. With a dedicated team that includes healthcare professionals and with deep sector experience, who fully understand the opportunities and challenges as highlighted in the Survey, we have the capital, the commitment, the capability and the appetite to help nursing home businesses grow and succeed.

## 2 Nursing Homes Ireland

### 2.1 Profile

Nursing Homes Ireland (NHI) is the representative organisation for the private and voluntary nursing homes sector. This sector, and the care our members provide, are central to healthcare delivery in Ireland. Private and voluntary nursing homes:

- Provide 22,342 beds
- Account for more than 80% of all long term care beds in the country, and,
- Provide direct Employment to more than 25,000 staff
- 

NHI was formed in January 2008. It is the single representative body for the private and voluntary nursing homes sector following the merger of The Federation of Irish Nursing Homes, The Irish Nursing Homes Organisation, Nursing Homes Association South East and Nursing Homes West.

NHI's Mission Statement reads: *"Our purpose is to support and represent the interests of our Members in the independent care sector, promoting excellence and quality of life."* NHI is committed to providing leadership, supporting members and promoting excellence and is striving to fulfil such objectives by:

- Working in partnership with our members and other stakeholders to achieve best practice in the care of the older person in all nursing homes
- Ensuring that providers have a voice in the strategic direction and development of future nursing homes services
- Achieving adequate and fair funding for nursing homes to enable them to provide high quality care for all
- Working in partnership to ensure that regulation is effective, proportionate and transparent

### 2.2 Our Vision for the Future

As a nation, Ireland still has the resources to develop the best possible services to meet the needs of a growing older population.

We in Nursing Homes Ireland have a significant contribution to make in developing those services, so that residential care for our older people is the best that it can be. Nursing Homes fulfil Government objective of delivering high quality, person centred in the community. We have the expertise, the commitment and the willingness to work alongside the Government and all other key stakeholders in the sector to ensure long-term residential care is meeting the increasingly complex care requirements of persons moving to nursing homes.

Our expertise and our ideas are of key importance in informing the development of public policy on the care of older people. We are advancing and promoting this important

debate, as key providers of a vital part of the health service, and seeking the appropriate support framework to meet the challenges of growing and funding the best possible services for our older people.

NHI's vision is to lead and shape the environment in which care services provided by our Members achieve the highest quality of life for the residents in their care. It is one we are continuously advancing through meaningful partnership with the Government, the HSE and the National Treatment Purchase Fund (NTPF) as purchasers, the Health Information and Quality Authority (HIQA) as the regulator, our members and all the stakeholders.

Having high quality care available to those who need it is an essential part of a well-functioning health service which delivers the care people need, in a way that is affordable, accessible, and, of the highest standard. Those who use our services should have the choice and flexibility in selecting the nursing home that most suits their needs.

### **2.3 *Commitment of Members***

**Nursing Home Ireland members are committed to:**

- Maintaining and enhancing the quality of life of residents
- Preserving the autonomy of residents, guaranteeing free expression of opinion and freedom of choice
- Maintaining a safe physical and emotional environment
- Ensuring that the privacy and dignity of residents is respected
- Being an employer of choice and providing continuous professional development and training

### **ENSURING HIGH STANDARDS**

For a number of years, our members consistently and actively sought the introduction of national standards for residential care settings for older people. We have welcomed the establishment of HIQA as the independent body charged with ensuring that public, private and voluntary nursing homes provide high quality care to their residents. NHI's continuous provision of specialist training is enabling Members meet and exceed national care regulations and standards.

### **MEETING THE TRUE COST OF CARE**

NHI is advancing the critical requirement for an enhanced framework that recognises and supports the increasingly complex care requirements of nursing home residents. The private and voluntary nursing home sector must be provided with certainty and a funding framework that ensures it is in a position to plan and invest in meeting the increasing residential care needs of our ageing population.

There is requirement for an enhanced evidence-based cost-of-care funding model to ensure the specialised care needs of those requiring long-term residential care are



addressed. An enhanced model to support residents in long-term residential care must recognise the increased dependency and complex care needs of residents in such care. It must address the specialised care needs of residents such as those with dementia and/or acquired brain injury.

The Dementia Services Information and Development Centre (DSIDC) (*An Irish National Survey of Dementia in Long Term Residential Care*) and the Oireachtas Joint Committee on Health and Children (*Report on End of Life and Palliative Care in Ireland*) have recommended the introduction of an evidence-based cost of care model to support persons requiring long-term residential care.

### **Management & Governance**

NHI represents the interest of its Members and the nursing home sector through an effective, democratic governance structure. As the national representative organisation for the private and voluntary nursing home sector, NHI is organised through 10 regional committees, with governance provided by a 12- member Board of Directors.

The Board, elected annually, consists of the 10 elected regional committee representatives, a national nursing committee representative and a non-executive independent chairman who is appointed by the Board.

The organisation is structured so that members are encouraged and assisted to play an active part in its deliberations and its decision making processes.

The NHI governance structure affords all members membership of one of ten regional committees; each region elects a representative to the Board of Directors.

The regions also elect a representative to the National Nursing Committee and a regional chair and regional secretary. Furthermore, each region elects annually a regional representative to named subcommittees as specified by the Board of Directors. Each of the 10 NHI regions directly elect at their regional AGM a representative to the following 3 Board subcommittees: Regulatory Affairs, Commercial and Financial Affairs and Public Affairs and Communications.

To encourage and facilitate greater involvement of members in the affairs of the organisation, NHI has established subcommittees of the Board of Directors to assist in managing the affairs of the organisation and to ensure that all relevant issues are appropriately addressed.

### 3 Presentation of Survey Results

#### 3.1 Survey Period

The survey was conducted in February 2015. A total of 152 nursing home operators returned completed surveys equalling the previous highest return rate. The information returned in the survey pertains to the 2014 financial year.

#### 3.2 Regional Analysis

In order to provide meaningful regional analysis and to ensure comparability of the Survey back to 2003, when the first survey was completed, information captured in the Survey is reported by reference to the ten NHI Regions which correspond approximately to the ten Health Board regions that existed prior to the introduction of new administrative structures within the HSE in 2005.

The regions of the country contained in each of the ten NHI Regions (“the Regions”) are outlined below:

- **Dublin/Wicklow** - Dublin South East and Wicklow.
- **Dublin North** - All of Dublin which is north of the Liffey.
- **Dublin/Kildare** - South West Dublin, West Wicklow and Kildare.
- **Midlands Area** - Laois, Longford, Offaly and Westmeath.
- **Mid-Western Area** - Limerick, Clare and Tipperary (North).
- **North-Eastern Area** - Cavan, Louth, Meath and Monaghan.
- **North-Western Area** - Donegal, Leitrim and Sligo.
- **South-Eastern Area** - Carlow, Kilkenny, Waterford, Wexford and Tipperary (South).
- **Southern Area** - Cork and Kerry
- **Western Area** - Galway, Mayo and Roscommon.

### ***3.3 Analysis by Size of Nursing Home Facility***

In addition to regional analysis, and where appropriate, information captured in the Survey is analysed by reference to the bed capacity of nursing homes. The following are the four size categories which have been used for the purposes of the Survey:

- Less than 25 beds
- 25 to 39 beds
- 40 to 59 beds
- 60 beds or more



#### 4 Key Industry Indicators

The table below outlines the key industry indicators reported in each survey completed between 2003 and 2014. (Between the years 2003 and 2006 the survey was commissioned by the Irish Nursing Homes Organisation. This organisation subsequently joined with three other nursing home representative organisations to form NHI.)

## 5 Private Nursing Home Beds - Current Supply & Growth Outlook

### 5.1 Registered Nursing Homes & Beds

There are presently 437 private and voluntary nursing homes in the country providing a total of 22,342 beds. The distribution of these homes and beds by HSE Area is outlined below:

## 5.2 Supply Growth - 2009 to 2014

Since the completion of the 2009/2010 Survey there has been a decrease in the number of nursing homes operating in Ireland from 447 in 2009 to 437 in 2014. Despite this there has been an 8.51% increase in private and voluntary nursing home bed supply. As can be seen from the table below the South, Dublin North, Northeast, and Dublin/Kildare regions recorded the greatest relative increases in bed supply.

The only NHI Region to have recorded a fall in bed numbers between 2009 and 2014 was the North-Western Area. A net reduction of 3 beds was noted in the region in the period, which follows on from a reduction of 88 beds between 2007 and 2009.

### 5.3 Supply Growth - 2003 to 2014

The pattern of supply growth since the Survey was first completed in 2003 is outlined below. In 2003 there were 14,946 private beds in the country compared with 22,342 in 2014.

In the eleven year period to 2014 there was a 49% increase in the supply of private beds. There was a net increase of 29 private nursing homes in the same period which represents an increase of just 7%.

A more detailed regional analysis illustrates that supply growth was greatest in the Midlands Area over the eleven year period. In that period there was a 97% increase in bed numbers in the Area. It is worth noting that in 2003 the Midlands Area had the highest population aged 65 and over per private nursing home bed nationally. This suggests that the Area was potentially undersupplied at that time and the percentage growth in bed stock in the eleven year period may have reflected this.

It is worth noting that amongst these there were 58,416 persons aged 85 and over, which is the section of the population with the highest demand for nursing home accommodation; it is estimated that approximately 22% of persons aged 85 and over require nursing home care<sup>1</sup>. With increasing life expectancy this section of the population is expected to grow steadily with the CSO forecasting that it will increase by a factor of four by 2046.

### 5.5 Planning approvals

Between 1st January 2013 and 31st May 2015 38 applications received approval for the construction of private & voluntary nursing home facilities. A further 84 applications have been approved for extensions to existing private & voluntary nursing homes in the same time period. The table below outlines the distribution of these approvals by county. Some of the developments relating to these approvals have been constructed at this stage.

## 5.6 Size of Nursing Homes

As discussed in Sections 5.2 and 5.3, since 2009 the total number of beds in the private and voluntary sector in 2014 has increased by 1,752 beds while at the same time the total number of nursing homes in operation has reduced by ten homes. This is indicative of a trend that suggests the closure of some smaller homes, expansions to existing nursing homes and the development of larger homes.

The distribution of nursing homes by size of **existing** facility is outlined below.

Approximately 42% of Survey respondents indicated that they intended to increase the bed capacity in their facilities in the coming year by an average of 19 beds indicating that this trend for the development of larger scale nursing homes set to continue.

## **6 Private Nursing Home Beds - Prospective Demand**

The population aged 65 and over is a population segment which is examined both nationally and internationally in the context of ageing and society. It is fair to say that with increasing life expectancy this metric looks somewhat out of date. The use of this metric in our survey is to ensure comparability with previous surveys and international metrics.

### **6.1 Population and Demand**

Ireland's demographic profile is characterised by increasing numbers of persons aged 65 and over. This 'ageing' of the population has resulted in growing demand for care facilities for the older person. Based on the indicative population projections discussed below, this demand will grow further in the future.

The most recently completed census was undertaken by the Central Statistics Office (CSO) in 2011. At that time the population aged 65 and over in Ireland was 539,303 or 11.8% of the total population. This represented an increase of 15% from the number of persons aged 65 and over since the completion of the previous census in 2006.

The distribution of the population aged 65 and over by NHI Region is outlined below. Comparison figures from the 2006 census and percentage changes between the two periods are also illustrated.

In 2011 the CSO estimated that the population aged 65 and over would reach c. 586,600 in 2014. This would represent an 8.8% increase in this segment of the population in three years. In order to estimate the impact of this in each region we have extrapolated the 2011 data for the estimated increase in the table below:

The CSO has also prepared longer term population projections to cover the period to 2046. The projections indicate that the population aged 65 and over will increase to approximately 1.4 million people over the course of the next c. 30 years. In this period of time the population aged 80 and over is set to reach c. 476,700 with over half of these being aged 85 and over. This will undoubtedly drive a large increased demand for nursing home care.

## 6.2 Population Aged 65 and Over per Registered Bed

A useful indicator of potential demand for private nursing home beds is the population aged 65 and over per registered bed. This indicator is not intended as a benchmark against which to definitively gauge the requirement for beds. The statistic should not be taken in isolation and should be considered in the context of occupancy levels. However, it is potentially the most useful indicator available when estimating potential demand for nursing home beds.

The table below outlines the population aged 65 and over per private nursing home bed in each NHI Region in 2014:

Currently there is one registered nursing home bed for every 20.23 persons aged 65 and over. The Dublin North Region (26.67 persons aged 65 and over per private bed) and West Region (17.49 persons aged 65 and over per private bed) were at opposite ends of the spectrum compared to the national average.

A high population of over 65 years per registered bed is not necessarily a reflection of supply/demand imbalance. For instance geographic factors such as whether the area is urban or rural may have an impact on the number of beds to the over 65 population. Additionally, other factors such as the Fair Deal rate available may have an impact on supply. Another factor worth considering is the availability of homecare packages and community care provision in a region, which might be a reason for lower occupancy etc.

## 7 The Independent Living Unit (ILU) Sector

### 7.1 Survey Findings

Approximately 12% of Survey respondents indicated that their nursing home was part of a retirement village development incorporating Independent Living Units (ILUs). On average each development consisted of 22 ILUs.

**Occupancy** - The average occupancy level reported by respondents operating ILUs was 80.79% nationally in 2014. Large variances were noted in occupancy levels regionally. All regions except the South-East Region had occupancy levels in excess of 70%. ILU developments in the Dublin North appear to have performed particularly well reporting 99% occupancy. Occupancy levels in the South East were reported at just 18%.

**Future plans** - Just over 1% of respondents indicated that they intended to develop ILU's.

The business case surrounding ILU's appears less certain than the business case for nursing home developments. This, in part, may be due to lack of availability of a funding scheme to cover the cost of care in ILU's for persons who might wish to move into close care type accommodation. In effect, there is no equivalent Fair Deal scheme for independent living for older persons.

## 8 Profile of Facilities

### 8.1 Bedroom Type

A breakdown of bedroom types in respondents' nursing homes is outlined below:

Single en-suite rooms were found to be the most common form of bedroom type available for residents in respondents' nursing homes. 59% of the total stock of private beds was found to be comprised of this room type, increased from 52% in 2009. A further 11% of the total stock was comprised of single rooms without en-suite facilities which sees a reduction in the proportion of this bedroom type from 15% in 2009.

Accommodation in double rooms accounted for c. 23% of room types available, the majority of which had en-suites. Multiple occupancy rooms accounted for the remainder of room types available at 7% down from 12% in 2009.

Provision of single rooms without en-suite facilities and multiple rooms is likely to continue to reduce considerably in the coming years due to the impact of HIQA's National Quality Standards for Residential Care Settings for Older People in Ireland ("the Standards") which came into force in July 2009.

The Standards stipulate that new nursing home facilities developed since July 2009 will be required to comply with the following requirements in relation to bedroom type<sup>2</sup>:

- A minimum of 80% of residents to be accommodated in single en-suite rooms.
- Shared rooms must be occupied by no more than two residents.
- Rooms to accommodate up to six highly dependent residents will be used only for the accommodation of high dependency residents or where the resident is in transition from hospital to nursing home care.

HIQA allowed nursing homes built prior to 2009 a six-year derogation to meet the specific Physical Environment Standards. However, July 2015 will see the end of this six year derogation period. In order to maintain registration any home not complying with the Standard will be required to demonstrate that they have a 'written, costed plan with timescales' to bring the home into compliance with the Standards as outlined in HIQA Regulatory Notice RN 001/ 2013. Even in those circumstances, HIQA have indicated that they will place Conditions of Registration on nursing homes, where in particular, they believe the existing physical environment does not adequately provide for the privacy and dignity of residents. This may further reduce the supply of public sector beds as many of these are contained in older facilities that are not compliant with the Standards.

### **8.2 Purpose Built Facilities**

Over three quarters of respondents were found to operate from purpose built nursing home facilities; in total 77% of respondents operated from such facilities. The remaining 23% were found to operate from facilities converted from another use.

### **8.3 Years in Operation**

The average period for which respondents were found to have operated their facility was 23.2 years. Facilities in the West, North East and Midlands regions were found to be, on average, the most recently developed. The average length of time respondents were found to be operating in these regions was 13.8 years.

Respondents in the Dublin/Wicklow region had the longest established facilities. On average they had been in operation for almost 44 years. This region contains the town of Bray which is sometimes referred to as the ‘historic capital of nursing homes’ and as such contains a large number of long established facilities. This region also contains one of the longest established older person care facilities in the country, which has been in operation for over 200 years.



## 9 Profile of Services Available

### 9.1 Specialised Dementia Facilities

According to The Alzheimer Society of Ireland there are presently over 48,000 people in the Republic of Ireland diagnosed with dementia. It is predicted that by 2036 there will be over 104,000 people living with dementia in the country.<sup>3</sup>

It is reasonable to assume that, on the basis of greater numbers of people living with the condition, demand for care in dedicated care units will increase.

Approximately 30% of respondents nationally were found to provide dedicated dementia care units within their nursing homes. Each of these units contained an average of 24 beds. Of those respondents that provided dedicated dementia care units, 98% operated from facilities with 40 beds or more.

It is interesting to contrast this with the findings of the Dementia Services Information and Development Centre (DSIDC) survey carried out in 2013 which indicated that 12% of nursing homes either contained or were considered to be a Specialist Care Unit (SCU) for the provision of dementia care. For the purpose of the DSIDC study a SCU was defined as being “*a designated unit designed to cater exclusively for the complex needs of people with dementia*”. The higher number of reported units in the NHI Survey may be indicative of the existence of number of ‘specialist units’ in the respondents to the NHI survey that do not meet the definition provided by the DSIDC.

Across all homes, it was reported that on average 45% of residents have been diagnosed with dementia. In homes providing specialist dementia care units this proportion is slightly higher at 47%. While the proportion is slightly lower in homes not providing specialist dementia care units is substantial nonetheless at 44%.

## 9.2 Other Specialist Facilities

Less than 1% of respondents indicated that they provided specialised units catering for residents with challenging behaviour.

Similarly, less than 1% of respondents provided a specialised brain injury care unit.

A range of other specialist care units were provided by just under 5% of respondents. All of these other units were found to be in nursing homes with 50 or more beds.

### 9.3 Day Care Facilities

Nationally just over 15% of respondents provided day care facilities. Of those that indicated they provided such facilities, 86% operated from nursing homes containing 40 beds or more.

Nationally, the average rate charged by respondents for provision of day care was €61 per day. This is reduced slightly from the national average rate of €64 noted at the time of completion of the 2009/2010 Survey.

### 9.4 Home Care Service

The survey found that 9% of homes were either currently providing home care services (whereby staff from the respondent's nursing home provided care services to persons in their own residences) or intended to do so in the next 12 months.

### 9.5 Contract Beds

Nationally 51% of respondents were found to have beds contracted to the HSE. Where contracts with the HSE were in place, on average 9% of the total beds in the nursing home were under contract. Since the advent of the NHSS the HSE has greatly reduced the number of contract beds funded, preferring instead for residents to apply to the NHSS and receive funding through this.

The following is a regional analysis of respondents that contracted beds to the HSE in 2014:

The Survey found that almost 17% of respondents retained/employed a full-time physiotherapist and/or occupational therapist in their homes with a further 66% retaining a therapist on a sessional basis.

Approximately 30% of respondents indicated that the services of a physiotherapist and/or occupational therapist was made available by the HSE to residents in their nursing homes. Ideally, this would be a much higher number. Residents retain the entitlement to this service, however, the provision of this service is not made available from the HSE with sufficient cover or frequency, as it appears there are long waiting lists.

## 10 Profile of Residents

### 10.1 Funding Profile of Residents

At present nursing home care for long-term residents is funded in one of the four following ways:

- **Nursing Home Support ('Fair Deal') Scheme** - Residents receive support towards their care under the Fair Deal. Fair Deal is a co-payment scheme.
- **Subvention** - Residents who were accommodated in private nursing homes prior to the commencement of the Fair Deal Scheme have been allowed to continue with their subvention arrangements if they wish rather than transfer to the Fair Deal Scheme.
- **Contract** - This category refers to residents that are publically funded by the HSE. Contract arrangements are in place between the HSE, private and voluntary nursing homes for the care of these residents. (This category is being phased out due to the Fair Deal Scheme.)
- **Private** - Residents who fund their care privately.

The Survey found the following to be the distribution of residents by funding classification in respondents' homes:

The above clearly shows a trend of the majority of residents now being funded through the Fair Deal scheme. As HSE Contract and Subvention beds are phased out it is likely that this proportion will increase further. It is worth pointing out that the 2009/2010 survey was conducted shortly after the introduction of the Fair Deal scheme, and consequently we believe why the population of residents on the Fair Deal scheme was as low as it was in 2009.



## 10.2 Age Profile of Residents

An age profile of residents accommodated in respondents' nursing homes is set out below. More than half of all residents were found to be aged over 85. 86% were aged 76 or over.

Comparable findings from the 2009/2010 Survey are also shown below. As can be seen there are now greater numbers of residents in the 86 plus category than in 2009. This ageing profile of nursing home residents is leading to increased dependency when admitted to homes (as evidenced at 10.3) as the requirement for nursing home care increases significantly in the over 85 cohort.

## 10.3 Dependency Levels

Over 65% of all residents accommodated in respondents' homes were in the high or max categories of dependency which is increased from 54% in 2009. The percentages noted for each category of care are outlined below:

The increase in dependency levels of residents is consistent with the anecdotal evidence from operators that older persons are being cared for in their own homes as long as possible and are only being admitted to nursing homes when they can no longer safely take care of themselves.

The application process for the NHSS (Fair Deal) has led to an increasing dependency profile of residents admitted to nursing homes as more independent older persons are, where funding is available, provided with home care and other supports to allow them to remain in their own homes.

The most utilised method of assessing resident dependency was the Barthel methodology at 83% of respondents.

## 10.4 Dementia

Approximately 45% of residents in respondents' nursing homes were found to have been clinically diagnosed with dementia, which represents an increase from 38% from the previous survey.

### ***10.5 Long-stay residents***

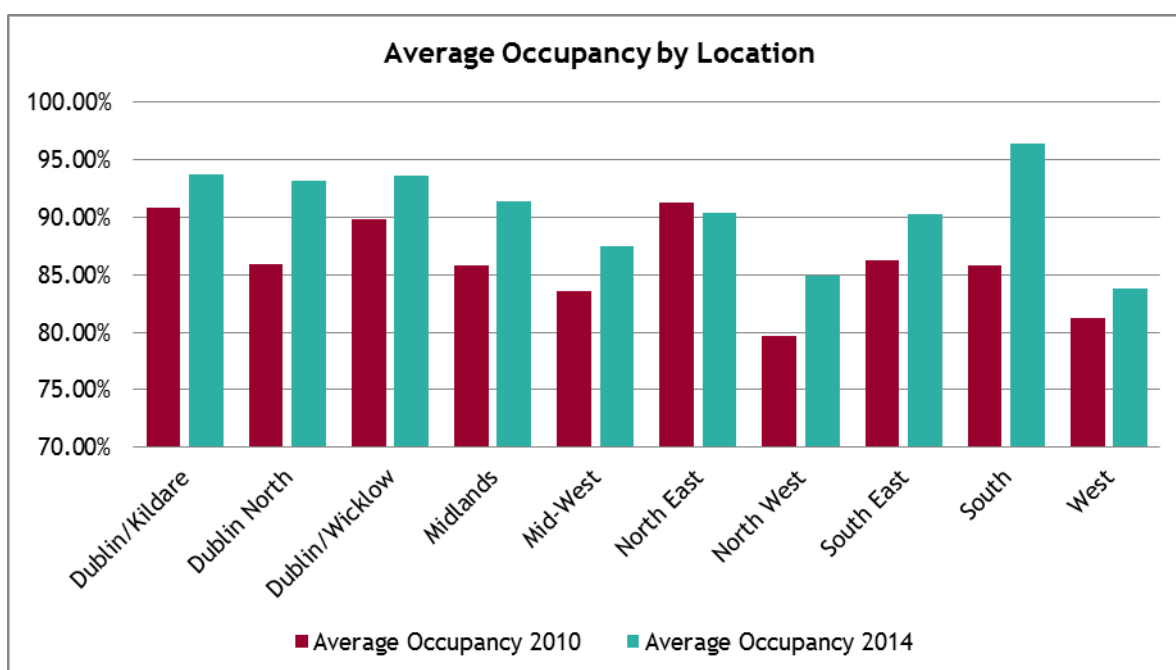
Long-stay residents accounted for 92% of all residents in respondents' nursing homes. The average length of stay per resident was reported to be 2.9 years, down from 3.6 years in 2009. This reduced length of stay suggests a shift towards people remaining in their own home with support of community care services until their dependency level dictates a need for full-time residential care and consequently higher dependency of nursing home residents.

## 11 Occupancy Levels

### 11.1 Occupancy by location

The average occupancy in 2014 amongst nursing homes nationally was 90.45%. This represents an increase of 4.05% percentage points since the completion of the 2009/2010 National Nursing Home Survey.

The graph below illustrates the annual average percentage occupancy levels reported by Survey respondents in each Area for 2014:



The Southern Region recorded the highest average occupancy in 2014 with an average occupancy percentage of 96%. Correspondingly the Western Region recorded the lowest average at 84%.

There is evidence that low occupancy in private and voluntary homes has been as a result of well publicised and acknowledged<sup>4</sup> delays in processing applications for the Fair Deal Scheme, with the time taken to process applications in many cases taking in excess of three months in 2014.

All regions except the North East Region recorded an increase in average occupancy. The Southern Region experienced the largest increase in occupancy rising from 86% in 2009 to 96% in 2014. While occupancy decreased slightly in the North East Region, the respondents in that region nonetheless recorded an average occupancy of just over 90%. Conversely, while the regions located on the west coast (West, Mid-West and North-West) recorded

increases in occupancy, the average occupancies in these regions ranged between 83.84% and 87.53%.

## 11.2 Occupancy by size

Average occupancy levels based on nursing home size categorisation fell in homes sized between 25-39 beds, however, occupancy rose in all other categories of homes. The table below illustrates the averages for each year and the percentage changes noted for each category:

## 12 Weekly Rates

### 12.1 Overview - The Fair Deal

The commencement of the Nursing Home Support Scheme (“the Scheme” or “The Fair Deal”) on 27<sup>th</sup> October 2009 was a landmark development for older persons seeking nursing home care, their families and also for the private nursing home sector in Ireland.

The Nursing Homes Support Scheme is a scheme of financial support for people who need long-term nursing home care. Under the Nursing Homes Support Scheme, the resident will make a contribution towards the cost of nursing home care and the State will pay the balance. This applies whether the nursing home is public, private or voluntary.

The National Treatment Purchase Fund (NTPF) has been designated by the Minister for Health to negotiate prices with nursing homes for the provision of care under The Fair Deal. In July 2009 the NTPF offered each registered nursing home in the country the opportunity to participate as a care provider under the Scheme.

Since the introduction of the Fair Deal scheme, the NTPF has negotiated rates with all but one nursing home in Ireland. The NTPF is agreeable to negotiating short (i.e. one year or less) agreements, or longer (i.e. up to five years and longer in some instances) agreements. Fair Deal rate negotiation is an important part of the business of long term care.

The NHSS is by far the largest commissioner and funder of long term care in Ireland. The NTPF are tasked with the negotiation of rates for long term care on behalf of the HSE. In recent times, the NTPF have sought price reductions from nursing home providers and this has led to high levels of dissatisfaction among nursing home providers that prices provided for care provision are falling when costs, both operational and capital, are rising. A majority of operators surveyed believe the methodology of negotiating and pricing care is not fair or resident focused. There is widespread belief that the pricing methodology is imprecise, lacking science and also lacking consistency

A methodology that considers the actual costs of providing nursing home care would be preferable and has been called for by both the DISDC and the Oireachtas Health Committee:

*DSIDC, An Irish National Survey of Dementia in Long-Term Residential Care: “In particular, payments made through the NTPF need to be commensurate with level of care, staff training and skill mix and type of non-pharmacological interventions expected to be delivered.”*

*Oireachtas Health Committee, Report on End of Life & Palliative Care in Ireland (July 2014): “In reviewing the current Fair Deal Scheme an evidence-based cost of care model could be used in assessing the real cost of residential nursing home care in Ireland .”*

## 12.2 Weekly Rates - Private & Voluntary and Public Facilities

The average Fair Deal rates prevailing for accommodation in private nursing homes and the average rate prevailing for public nursing home facilities by county at present are outlined below<sup>5</sup>:

The average weekly Fair Deal rate has risen in all counties since 2009. Donegal experienced the highest relative increase at 12.82%, however, it remains the lowest county average in Ireland at €748 per week. The highest county average can be found in Dublin where the rate rose by 3.09% to €1,100 per week. As can be seen above, without exception the published weekly rates for publicly provided accommodation continue to exceed weekly rates for privately provided accommodation in every county in Ireland.

It is worth noting that the overall increase since 2009, a five year time horizon, is only 5.4% representing a circa 1% annual increase. Much of this small annual increase was awarded because of Fair Deal contracts which were linked to Consumer Price Index or had fixed interval increases.

### ***12.3 Private & Voluntary Facilities - Weekly Fair Deal Rates by NHI Region***

Outlined below are the current weekly Fair Deal rates prevailing for private & voluntary operators in each NHI Region.

#### 12.4 Services Included under the Fair Deal Scheme

It is important to note that the weekly rate payable to nursing home operators under the Scheme covers the following only:

- Bed and board
- Nursing and personal care
- Bedding
- Laundry service
- Basic aids and appliances

The following services are specifically **excluded** under the Fair Deal Scheme:

- Daily delivery of newspapers
- Social programmes
- All therapies
- Incontinence wear\*
- Chiropody
- Dry cleaning
- Ophthalmic and dental services
- Transport (including care assistant costs)
- Specialised wheelchairs
- Hairdressing and other similar services

\*For Fair Deal residents these are provided by the HSE

#### 12.5 NTPF Negotiations

The Fair Deal scheme has come under considerable financial pressure since its launch. There is a capped budget with which to provide funding for all those older people who require nursing home care and this does not appear to be sufficient to cover the large number of people requiring this care. As a result the NTPF have been reluctant to agree increases in Fair Deal rates and appear to be attempting to balance any increases given to homes on low rates against reductions to homes on higher rates. While 40% of respondents secured a marginal increase in their most recent NPTF negotiations, 24% retained their existing rate, and 26% suffered a reduction in rate (10% of respondents did not give details on this). Minister Kathleen Lynch has noted that this ‘capped budget’ approach is inconsistent with the demand-led approach as with the medical card scheme<sup>6</sup>.

## 13 Financial Performance

### 13.1 Turnover per Registered Bed by Location

The average turnover per registered bed reported by respondents in respect of their most recent financial year is outlined below. Results were found to vary widely by location, however, there is a clear upward trend which is reflective of both increases in occupancy and rate.

Respondents in the Dublin/Wicklow Region recorded an average turnover per bed of €56,727. This was the highest average amongst all Regions. Correspondingly respondents in the South-East Region reported the lowest average at €33,929. The Western Region experienced the largest increase in turnover per bed compared with 2009, up 32% to €36,035, however, this remained lower than the national average of €44,451 per bed.

Turnover in 2014 increased per registered bed due to two reasons, namely;

- Average fee rates increased between 2009 and 2014; and
- Occupancy levels also increased over the five year period.

Therefore when the increased turnover is analysed by registered bed, the national average increase has improved by 20% in that time horizon.

### 13.2 Turnover by Size

Average annual turnover per bed categorised by size of nursing home is set out below. Interestingly, as in the 2009/2010 survey, respondents operating in the '25 bed or less' size category reported higher turnover per registered bed than in the 40-59 category. However, it is clear that homes in excess of 60 beds generate significantly more revenue on a per bed basis.

## 14 Staffing Matters

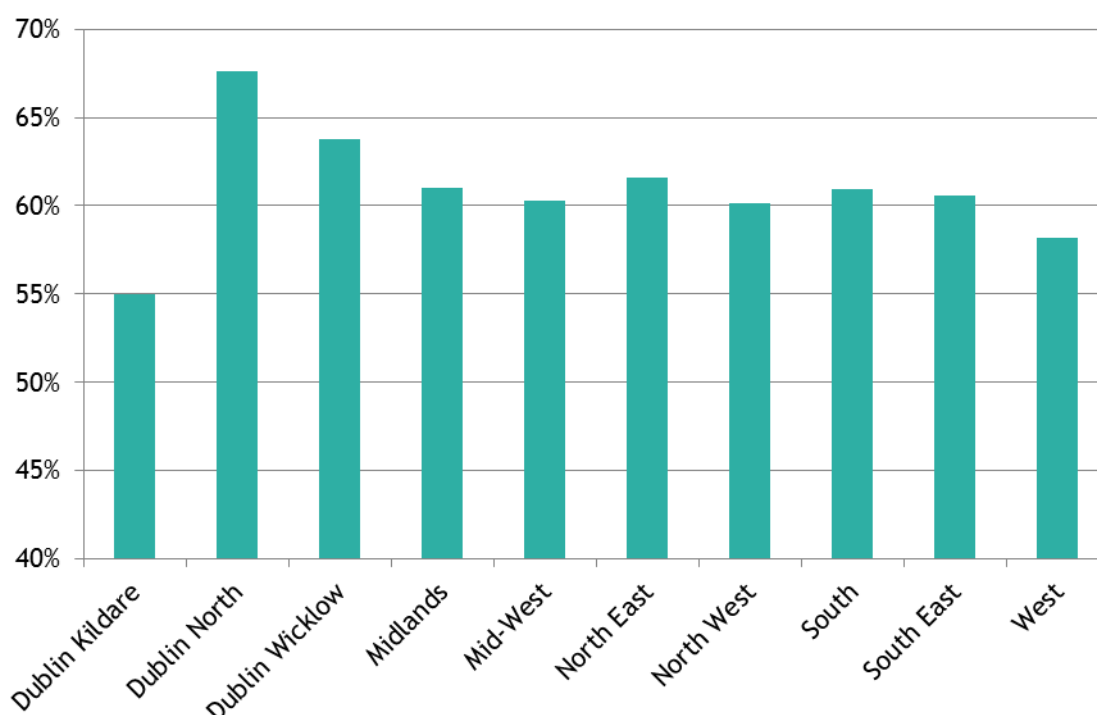
### 14.1 Staff Costs

Staff costs are the largest category of cost incurred in the operation of a nursing home.

#### 14.1.1 Staff Costs as a Percentage of Turnover

Nationally in 2014 staff costs accounted for 61.03% of turnover in respondents' homes, which was almost unchanged from the figure reported in 2009 of 61.5%. Regionally, staff costs accounted for the following percentages of turnover:

### Staff Cost as a % of Turnover



It is interesting to note that the Dublin North region is reporting the highest staff cost/turnover ratio despite having the highest average weekly Fair Deal rate. Further analysis reveals that the average staff costs are being driven up by the large number of voluntary homes in the region, which traditionally have experienced higher staff costs than in private homes. When voluntary homes are excluded from this analysis, the average ratio of staff costs/turnover in the Dublin North region is reported at 58%.

### 14.1.2 Staff Costs per Registered Bed

The national average staff cost per registered bed in respondents' homes increased by 18% between 2009 and 2014 with the national average for 2014 being €27,134 per bed.

The Southern region experienced the largest increase in staff costs since 2009 with staff costs in this region increasing 35%. The South East region was the only region to experience a fall in staff cost per bed, falling 6% to €20,557. This region now has the lowest staff cost per registered bed. It is worth noting that homes in their first year of operation will have a lower staff cost per registered bed as occupancy builds up due to the lower numbers of staff required compared to homes with high occupancy and so this may impact on the average costs reported in a particular area. Average staff costs per registered bed for each of the NHI Regions are set out in the table below:

## 14.2 Individual Salary Levels & Hourly Rates

### 14.2.1 Director of Nursing & Clinical Nurse Manager

In 2014 the national average gross salaries for Directors of Nursing and Clinical Nurse Managers (CNM) were €63,854 and €45,155 respectively.

The Survey found that where a Director of Nursing was employed in a Respondent's home, 42% of persons occupying the position were involved in the direct care of residents. The remaining 58% held a management role only.

Approximately 74% of respondents employed a CNM in addition to a Director of Nursing. Of the respondents who do employ a CNM, 95% report that the CNM is involved in the direct care of residents with on average 32 hours per week of direct care being provided by CNM's.

#### 14.2.2 Care Staff - Hourly Rates

The average hourly rates (excluding PRSI and levies) for staff nurses and care assistants in 2014 were €18.64 and €10.69 respectively. A schedule of hourly rates by NHI Region is outlined below:

Anecdotally, we have been informed that there is significant pressure on operators to increase staff pay rates. Almost 32% of respondents increased staff pay rates in 2014 and 50% of respondents indicated that they expected to increase rates in 2015. On average overall pay rates for nurses increased by an average of 2.16% with HCA rates increasing by an average 1.54% in 2014. However, when homes that did not give an increase are excluded, these figures rise to an average of 7.32% and 5.41% respectively. Of the respondents who expected to pay an increase in 2015, the average expected increase for nurses was 4.16% with the average increase for care assistants expected to be 3.9%.

#### 14.2.3 Support Staff - Hourly Rates

A schedule of hourly rates by HSE Area for the various support roles in respondents' homes is outlined below. All are shown exclusive of PRSI and levies.

### 14.3 Other Staff Related Findings

Outlined below are some other key staff related Survey findings:

- Staff turnover: respondents reported an 11.3% staff turnover in 2014.
  - The most common reason cited for nursing staff leaving was to take up employment with the HSE, followed by retirement.
  - In the case of care assistants the most common reason for leaving was retirement, followed by leaving for the HSE.
- Training hours: Nursing homes were found to provide, on average a total 415 hours of training for their care staff in 2014.
- Nationality of nursing staff: The Survey found that on average 28% of nurses employed in respondents' homes were from outside the European Union (EU) (reduced from 41% in 2009). A further 15% were from the EU (excluding Ireland) with the balance of 57% of nurses being Irish.

### 14.4 Direct Care Hours

Direct care refers to care provided to nursing home residents by nursing and care assistants.

At present there are no regulations governing the number of care hours to be provided to nursing home residents per day. The HIQA Standards stipulate that *“at any point in time, the number and skill mix of staff on duty is determined and provided according to transparently applied, nationally validated, assessment tool, to plan for and meet the needs of the residents”*<sup>7</sup>.

As of yet, however, such an assessment tool has not been established. A staffing matrix which is dependency based would be a welcome addition to the long term care sector.

In the absence of a regulatory framework international best practice is frequently used by nursing home operators for guidance on direct care staffing and is consistent with the findings of higher dependency levels in Irish Nursing Homes.

Survey respondents were found, on average, to provide 3.67 care hours per day to each resident accommodated in their respective nursing homes. This represents a 0.27 hour increase per resident per day on the levels noted in the 2009/2010 Survey.

## 15 Food Costs

### 15.1 Analysis by Size

When analysed by size of nursing home the following were the findings in relation to average food cost per registered bed in 2014:

As can be seen above while homes with 25-39 beds experienced a significant increase in food costs per bed between 2009 and 2014, homes with 40 or more beds saw a much more modest increase in costs on a per bed basis. It would appear that these homes are capable of achieving greater economies of scale through bulk purchasing of food and provisions. Unusually, homes with less than 25 beds actually saw a decrease in the cost of food per bed.

## 16 Other Expenditure

### 16.1 Repairs & Maintenance Costs

Repairs & Maintenance has proved a significant cost in recent years. On average respondents reported that almost 4% of turnover was spent on repairing their home in 2014. The below table analyses the Repairs & Maintenance costs per bed in relation to home size:

## 17 HIQA Compliance Costs

### 17.1 Overview

As noted in Section 8.1 the derogation period to comply with the HIQA's Standards in relation to the physical environment is set to come to an end in July 2015. The Standards, which are underpinned by legislation, contain detailed regulations regarding the operation of nursing homes. Nursing homes that were in existence prior to the standards becoming operational will have to meet specified physical environment regulations. In addition HIQA have, on inspection of nursing home facilities, directed operators to review staffing levels and make other alterations to staff rotas and supervisory roles.

As a result, considerable refurbishment works have been undertaken by many private and voluntary homes across the country resulting in significant capital expenditure.

### 17.2 Survey Findings

The Survey sought to establish the costs which have been incurred in the previous 36 months and also total incurred to date by respondents in complying with HIQA directions following inspections by the Authority of their respective facilities. The following is the average cost incurred in the previous 36 months and to date by respondents nationally:

Given the large cost of compliance with the Standards it is perhaps unsurprising that some operators, unable to achieve a satisfactory 'Fair Deal' rate, were unable to fund the necessary expenditure and so were forced to take the decision to close their homes.

The above table illustrates the differences in financial performance by nursing homes categorised by home size. As can be seen from the table while having the highest turnover per registered bed, homes with 60 beds or more also had the highest staff cost per bed in monetary terms. Homes with less than 25 beds and homes with 40-59 beds not only had lower staff costs in absolute terms but also had a lower staff cost/turnover ratio. This would appear to be counterintuitive, as one would expect that larger homes should be capable of achieving economies of scale not possible in smaller homes. However, further analysis indicates that there are a considerable number of voluntary homes in the ≥60 beds category. As discussed previously, these homes tend to have higher staff costs than private homes. If voluntary homes are excluded this ratio falls below 60%. Analysis of food costs, repairs and maintenance costs and training costs illustrate the economies of scale achieved by homes with 60 beds or more. These homes have the lowest spend per bed in both absolute and percentage terms on Food and Repairs costs and the second lowest spend per bed on Training.
